History of Matehy Cemetery & Historic Church

'This cemetery is located opposite St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church in the small village of Matehy. The perimeter of the cemetery is defined by a large stone wall in which is contained some walls of a ruined church, the Matehy Parish Church, which are ivy-clad and flanked by a number of towering yew trees. The church was in a ruinous state in AD 1615.

History of Matehy Graveyard/Cemetery with its ruined Parish Church.

Matehy Graveyard erstwhile dubbed, "The Moving Graveyard" lies 8 kms west of Blarney Village. 'Teichtic', a legendary pagan Chieftain, lived here. He ruled from this prominent elevated hill-top fortress. The late Sr Angela (Evelyn) Bolster, Diocesan Archivist UCC, Lecturer and noted historian, author and publicist, has suggested that many of our ancient Christian hilltop burial sites can be traced, through the mists of time, to our Pagan ancestors. This learned proposition resonates with, and links us to, the fascinating ancient story that is 'Matehy'.

'Teichtics' fortress is now the site of Matehy Graveyard and the surrounding plain has been anglicised as Matehy i.e. 'Mágh Mach Teichtic', 'The Plain of the son of Teichtic'. (Across the road, St Joseph's RC Church, built 1875)

In 'The Pipe Roll of Cloyne' (McCotter/Nicholls, Cloyne Lit. Soc., '96, p. 239) McCotter states with reference to Matehy, "The title of the name is now represented by Vicarstown. '

Mághmactechedy 'represents the original of the later form 'Matehy'. Mághmacthethyt and Mágmacteht, 1306. The rectorial tithes of Matehy Parish like those of all the Cogan fee in Muscrimittine, belong to the Precepetory of Mourne. 1200 Mourne Abbey (near Mallow) was founded C. 1200 as Preceptory of Knights Hospitallers by Alexander de Helena". Matehy linked to Crusades

1291 Parish reports to Pope Nicholas 1V suggests that Inniscarra and Magumkeda (Matehy) operated in unison. 1291, "P'benda Magri, Phil O Hynovan. Ecca de Imscara et Magumkeda xxs decima 11s" (Tax P. Nic.) (Pipe Roll, McCotter, '96.)

Matehy twinned with Ardfert in Kerry

1447 Carolus alias Cenfaelayotuma, (also spelt Keanfela Otuoma- Cennfaelad Ó Tuama) a priest of Ardfert diocese was Vicar of the parish of Matehy 1489; Dermot Othuama was perpetual vicar of Dromad [Diocese of Ardfert] in succession to Maurice O Thuama, while in the following year a papal mandate assigned to Donald Othuama (Diocese of Cloyne), the vicarage of Matehy Parish. The Otuama family have had, until recently, a presence in this area/site. Note the mysterious link with Ardfert with its historical association with St. Brendan the Navigator]. Reformation 1541.

'Under the Establishment the Rectory and Vicarage of Inniscarra were united with the Rectory and Vicarage of Matehy, or Mathea, and the Chapelry of Kilmurry [North] to constitute the corps of the Prebend of Inniscarra in the Cathedral of Cloyne. [Church and Parish records.... Cole....1903] 1770 'Church of Inniscarra in repair,..... that of Matehy in ruins,.....glebe at Matehy comprising of, 11 acres 1 Rood and 7 Perches. The rectory of Matehy formerly belonged to the preceptory of Mourne'.

1834 The Protestant population of Inniscarra was 117; of Matehy 45. [Brady ,1863, clerical and parochial records, Cork, Cloyne and Ross].

1700 -1900s... Matehy Graveyard/Cemetery, Gilcaugh.

Here is buried Denny Lane who composed the beautiful song 'Carrigdhoun'. At the north side is Fox's Bridge, supposed to have derived its name from an English soldier named Fox, who slew a priest who was celebrating mass in Matehy Church. Captain Fox was pursued by the irate congregation and was killed by a fall from his horse at the ford of the Shournagh River. [Bruno O Donoghue 'Place names West Cork, 91']. Fox was buried in the nearby Loughane Cemetery. Locals were incensed and removed the remains of their recently interred relatives. These were then buried in this burial site at Matehy. This gave rise to the legend of 'The Moving Graveyard.' This story is often 'misrepresented' by 'strangers' who conflate the slaying of a priest in Matehy, with the murder of a priest, Fr O Donoghue, years later, as he celebrated mass at 'Carraig- an-Aifreann', the nearby Mass rock at Ballyshonin. These were two separate, unconnected tragedies during the Penal times. However, we empathise with our fellow human beings worldwide, whose personal freedom, or beliefs, are not respected.
